Dwight Holland---- I always told people he was half man, half myth, and half legend. Yes technically that is three halves, but as an analogy it still works because they some of the half's overlap each other and it is hard to tell were one ends and the others begin and let's face it thirds just wouldn't be adequate.

I first meet Dwight shortly after I began my tenure as director of the Guild. His name was already very familiar to me because since a very young age I had taken many camps and classes upstairs at the Guild in "Holland Hall".

Like any good legend when I tried to get some background before I met with him everyone had a slightly different version of the story. Some would say he was the first art teacher in Asheboro, others that he was the first in the county, and others that he was first in the state and would go from school to school like a Johnny Appleseed of the arts. There was a little more consensus about his tenure at the NC Zoo and on his leadership in founding the Randolph Arts Guild and the NC Potters Conference. But like great art his life was lived with nuance and layers that words can never truly capture.

Our initial meeting was about The North Carolina Potters Conference or just simply Potter's Conference (because as some would say - it was the first of course). Dwight had a presence and held himself with posture and a declarative cadence of speaking that is becoming more and more rare these days. It would be the first of many meetings we would have during my years at the Guild. He would describe a grand vision for an idea and I would fret about the details, dollars, and how we would actually make it happen. He would always focus on the idea. If one ever lost sight of the vision a sharp email from Dwight would arrive to redirect course, and sometimes a sharp email would just arrive preemptively to ensure success.

I had the privilege of being able to help him host the 25th Anniversary of Potters Conference as well as the conferences that featured potters from China and Japan.

Dwight was a man focused on great ideas and believed strongly in the importance of sharing them. It was an honor to get to know a man of such great vision, who knew what he wanted, and was not a afraid to take on big challenges and to see them through.

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One of the first public school art teachers in NC and established the first comprehensive art program for a small school system in NC






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



Founder and chairman of the Randolph County fall Festival for 14 years. Help other cities organize their festivals. Also founder of Randolph Christmas Parade.








Designed and assisted in directing the production of the downtown mural, the first historical downtown mural, Have assisted other towns in doing murals projects.

Carol Kroll: The evolving of Carol's art followed the outsourcing of her nearly three decade career as a textile designer. Her transformation began with her deeply felt connection to the natural world, a love of gardening and her passion for art. Carol discovered the world of gourd art through the internet and began growing gourds to use as art medium. She literally sowed the seeds that would guide her artistic voice and catapult her into becoming a full-time mixed media sculptor. Carol is inspired by the gourds' form, texture and history. She takes a material rich in history and moves it forward with contemporary design. Her work celebrates the beauty and wonder of natures' design. Carol's work has won numerous awards and can be found in collectors' homes and businesses nationally and internationally.



Martha Danek is a mixed media artist who lives and works in the small town of Bynum, North Carolina. She began painting gourds while studying fine art at Meredith College in the early 1990's, and has been making gourd art ever since. She continued her education at UNC Chapel Hill, earning a Masters in Education in 1993, and becoming a school guidance counselor. After working for seven years with the Chatham County School System, she and her husband began a family, and she combined that new career of motherhood with art.



Martha has been participating in the Chatham Studio Tour for the past twenty-five years, showing works in a variety of media, but becoming more and more focused on gourds. She especially enjoys the unique experience of painting on surfaces that are already parts of beautiful, naturally grown shapes. She and her family grow most of the gourds she uses in her work, making the experience of creating gourd art even more personal; after growing, drying, scrubbing, and opening each gourd, she already has a connection to the piece before she starts to paint it. The themes

that appear most often in her painted sculptures are those relating to plant and animal life, and to family connections. Martha is honored to show her work in the company of the artists represented here, and hopes that visitors enjoy this exposure to the multi-faceted, unpretentious world of gourds!

Cara Bevan is an accomplished multifaceted artist who has been teaching art in central NC for over 3 years. Growing up on the Bevan Farm in Trinity, she credits her artistic endeavors to her artistic family and her affinity for animals (which you see in her artwork). She

attended the John C. Campbell Folk School located deep in the North Carolina mountains in the small town of Brasstown. Inspired and revitalized by the great mountain folks Cara soon realized her potential and began her journey as a professional artists and teacher. Cara's art style is a blend of whimsical and fun

mixed with attention to minute details. She is most known for her acrylic paintings and 3D gourd sculptures.
