Painting on Bisque Pottery with Stephanie Lambert / Ages 15 + / Saturday,

June 17, 10 am - 2 pm

Fiber Arts

Learn a new technique for pottery by painting an image onto a tile. And this is not just any ordinary image. You can let your imagination run wild as Stephanie leads you through the technique that allows you to create a full rendering on your tile, as simple or complex as you wish. Your choice of image, and tile will be provided. All materials are provided. \$40 (members) / \$45 (nonmember). Enrollment deadline is June 12.

Introduction to Weaving: Tussah Silk Scarves with Jean Vollrath / Ages 18 + / Tuesdays, April 3 - May 23, 6:30 pm - 8:30 pm Learn to weave with a finished, ready-to-wear (or gift!) silk scarf. This classes teaches you the basics of the floor loom, a foundation in weaving, and finishing

techniques, including the option to dye your scarf. Class instruction will be on Tuesday evenings with open studio between classes to allow you to finish your project. Overall class size is limited to five students. All materials are provided. \$140 (members) / \$160 (nonmember). Enrollment deadline is March 24.



Handspinning on a Drop Spindle with Grace McFetters / Ages 6 + / Saturday, May 6, 10 am - 12 noon

Have you ever wondered where your clothes come from? In this class, instructor will teach students how to assemble and use a drop spindle to transform raw fiber into yarn. All materials are provided: You will go home with your very first drop spindle and wool to spin into yarn. \$20 (members) / \$25 (nonmember). Enrollment deadline is April 30.

Lap Quilting for Children / Ages 7 - 15 / Saturdays, May 6 & 13, 9 am - 12 noon

This class is intended to teach young children and adolescents how to piece together and hand quilt a small wallhanging or lapquilt, just in time for Mother's Day! Basic piecing and hand quilting also teaches youngsters valuable life skills such as sewing and spatial relationships using basic geometry. Materials are provided, although if you have a favorite material, bring it! Lunch is not provided. \$40 (members) / \$45 (nonmember). Enrollment deadline is May 4.

Felting with Fiber with Jerry O'Donnell/ Ages 15 + / Saturday, May 20, 9 am - 12 noon

Find creative power in the art of transforming fibers into fabric using wet felting! This class will teach you the basic techniques of wet felting a scarf or shawl. Most materials are provided, except bring your own "rag" towel. Lunch is not provided. \$80 (members) / \$85 (nonmember). Enrollment deadline is May 12.

Handspinning on a Spinning Wheel with Grace McFetters / Ages 15 + / June 6, 6 - 8 pm;

June 18, 1 - 3 pm.

Spinning wool into yarn using a spinning wheel. Learn the basics of drafting, spinning singles and double ply yarns, and wheel mechanics and maintenance. All materials and equipment are provided. Class size is limited to three students. This class not fit your schedule? You may inquire about one-on-one lessons with Grace through the Arts Guild Program Director. Cost of class is \$40 (member) / \$50 (nonmember), 4 oz. of fiber and spinning wheel rental included in the cost of the class. Registration deadline is day before class offering. *Felt.*

The Randolph Arts Guild is proud to announce the 35th Annual Juried Arts Show. Artists may deliver their entries on Friday, June 2, between 10 am until 5 pm and Saturday, June 3, between 10 am and 2 pm. The selected entrieswill be exhibited during the month of June in the Sara Smith Self Gallery.

Entry fess is \$20 for RAG members \$25 for nonmembers. Each artist may submit up to three currrent pieces of their artwork for review by the juror. The juror will have full discretion to select the works to be displayed in the Gallery and all works not selected will be hung salon-style in Gallery 101 in the "Salon de Refuse." The Randolph Arts Guild reserves the right to not display all works as it see fit.

Cash prizes will be given for Best in Show (\$200), First Place (\$150), Second Place (\$100) and Third Place (\$50). The show is open to all artists working in any media. APRIL - Fiber to Fabric by Jerry O'Donnell / April 24, 7 pm / Open to All

Come visit with Gerald "Jerry" O'Donnell during his lecture exploring how fiber becomes fabric: a poetic transition, as he writes in his artist statement:

"A driving need within me to be creative and to explore fiber, has led me to the joy of experimentation by breaking the rules of fabric construction. My work of changing fiber into fabric brings together color blending, texture mixing, and tactile emotion, of the ancient craft of felting. Several felting techniques are used in my work, mainly Nuno, wet, and needle processing.

"The felting of fiber into fabric is the simple process of teasing open the scales of fiber to cause them to blend and adhere to themselves and each other. This is done with heat, pressure, and alkaline solution, applied to natural furs and hairs, such as wools, alpaca, camel, cashmere, silks, etc.

"To me, the value of my pieces lies in their ability to change the observer's idea of what cloth fabric is. Our everyday world takes fabric for granted. I want it to be seen as the unique manipulation of the ancient cloth making tradition."

His personal artist statement leaves one curious to know more. Jerry intends to leave us with inspiration and motivation to further explore the nuances of fibers, felting, and how an artist interacts through a tactile approach to art.

This lecture is open to the public, and no fee for attendance.
